

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



**The Transfiguration of the Lord:** This Sunday, we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. This feast, which falls on August 6, is celebrated even when it falls on a Sunday, because it is a Feast of the Lord. It is a special moment of grace for all of us to recall this important event in the life of Jesus. The Catechism of the Catholic Church has this to say about the Transfiguration:

“From the day Peter confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, the Master ‘began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things... and be killed, and on the third day be raised. ‘Peter scorns this prediction, nor do the others understand it any better than he. In this context, the mysterious episode of Jesus’ Transfiguration takes place on a high mountain, before three witnesses chosen by himself: Peter, James and John. Jesus’ face and clothes become dazzling with light, and Moses and Elijah appear, speaking ‘of his departure, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem’. A cloud covers him and a voice from heaven says: ‘This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!’” (CCC 554)

“On the threshold of the public life: the baptism; on the threshold of the Passover: the Transfiguration. Jesus’ baptism proclaimed ‘the mystery of the first regeneration’, namely, our Baptism; the Transfiguration ‘is the sacrament of the second regeneration’: our own Resurrection. From now on we share in the Lord’s Resurrection through the Spirit who acts in the sacraments of the Body of Christ. The Transfiguration gives us a foretaste of Christ’s glorious coming, when he “will change our lowly body to be like his glorious body.’ But it also recalls that ‘it is through many persecutions that we must enter the kingdom of God’” (CCC 556)

**Pilgrimage to the Holy Land:** On April 9-17, 2018, I will be leading a pilgrimage to the Holy Land with Fr. David Sizemore from St. Francis De Sales Church. We have one bus reserved for parishioners from Blessed Sacrament. There will be an information night this coming Wednesday, August 9, at 6:30 p.m. in Shepherd Hall. Representatives from the travel agency, Collette, will be present to share about the itinerary of the trip as will our pilgrimage coordinator. Please consider this opportunity. One of the many places we will visit is the location of the Transfiguration of the Lord!

**Debt from the Church Restoration and Rectory Renovation:** I wanted to give you an update about the financing of our church restoration project. As you may recall, in order to begin the project we needed 100% of the cost of the project pledged and 50% of the cost in cash. At that time, the Diocese of Columbus offered us a loan to cover the other 50%. Because of your generous giving, we did not need to access that loan until the end of the project. Some of our parishioners have paid off their entire pledge (thank you!) and others are making monthly payments toward their pledge (thank you!). I have no doubt that we will pay off the debt at the conclusion of the payment period and that the parish will not be left with any additional long-term debt due to this project.

Also, as you may recall, we had hoped to do a rectory renovation in conjunction with the church restoration project. As we began the project, I determined that it would be best to delay the rectory restoration until after the project was completed. The church restoration was our first priority and I wanted all of our attention on that. With the church restoration completed, I am in the planning stages of a rectory renovation. I am happy to announce that I anticipate that our capital campaign will be also able to fund the rectory restoration. In addition to that, I hope to conduct an exterior beautification project around the church. I am in the midst of planning both of these projects. I have decided that the most pressing need is the renovation of the rectory as I believe we, as a parish, need to be able to offer our priests a comfortable place to stay and a home that reflects well on our parish. I anticipate that I am in the last years of my time here in Newark and I am working to prepare the parish as much as possible for my successor. The eventual restoration of the rectory is a must.

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## God's Movement When We Move Away

Last week's letter addressed spiritual consolations and desolations. This week we follow on that theme by looking at how God works on our hearts in different phases of our spiritual journeys. We will look at Ignatius' first rule this week and his second rule next week. Ignatius developed a system of spirituality that his order still uses to this very day. Ignatian spirituality addresses how God speaks to us, even when we are mired and perhaps even longing for sin and sensuality. Many of us, young and old can fall into this category. We don't often think that God is with such people, but oh wrong we are! Let's look at what Ignatius says and see if that correlates to our 21<sup>st</sup> century lives.

Ignatius writes in his first rule that when a person is mired in mortal sin and moving from sin to sin, the enemy proposes sensual pleasures to him in order to make him attach him to his sins. God, in contradictory fashion, works on him by stinging and biting him in his conscience that is in man's rational nature of moral judgements. Ignatius writes that the Good Spirit works contrary to the enemy, Satan. God "stings" and "bites" us out of His love for us. A young man grew up in the Church, but by the time he graduated from high school he has forgone his faith and spends his life partying and working long hours. A number of years later he finds himself like the prodigal son, living a life of impurity and irresolution. This goes on a time and he has realized for quite a while that he is most unhappy and has a great shame and anger at how he has been living. He is like St. Augustine 1500 years ago who said "why not now, how long will I go on saying tomorrow?" Augustine heard a child sing a song saying "take and read take and read" and Augustine opened a bible and Romans 13. Our 21<sup>st</sup> century young man had an encounter with a joyful Christian and he realises he must change. Over time he prays again, attends Mass and confession again and his heart has been changed, softened, and no doubt renewed.

This person probably sounds like a lot of us, doesn't he? We are all affected by the commercialism of our culture, yet we know that this is not fulfilling. Ours is an exceedingly affluent nation, rich in resources, and blessed by God in copious ways. Satan knows this and he seeks to pervert our attractions to the good things God has provided us and so attach us to them and not to Him who made them. We go back to our 21<sup>st</sup> century young man again we see that he felt shame for his deeds. We also see that now he has a tremendous desire to discover and follow through upon God's will. He reflects back and can see the times he was blessed even while in the throes of sin; so often were there positive people but he didn't

listen to them; countless were the times when things could have gotten worse [it was a good thing he wasn't paying his guardian angel overtime that's for sure!]. In these instances, and others, God was biting at his conscience out of Love! God was saying to him: "I love you because I made you; I didn't have to make you, but I have a plan for your good that will sanctify the world. Now, wake up, and let me guide you to a new place!" He has found love and redemption in Christ; the biting of the Good Spirit has helped him to see when before he was blind; there is no turning back now!

God's voice is amazing; it is the only path to peace amidst the temptations of the enemy to be attached to physical things and to make them to be idols, dare I say to make them gods! God has a plan for our benefit and not for our destruction; this plan is fulfilled in the proper discernment of our particular vocations. God uses all of our experiences for the good, as difficult as that can seem. Our 21<sup>st</sup> century young man could well be called to the priesthood or marriage and finding his vocation through prayer, discernment, and good works are fantastic ways for him to respond to that "stinging" of the Good Spirit; the stinging that has called him back to the grace of the God! All of us who have had some life experience, can relate, at least to some degree to what our 21<sup>st</sup> century young man [and St. Augustine, and St. Ignatius, and many other saints!] experienced in their failure to find peace. Now, he can seek a joy he never knew before and so more and more in an increased freedom.

Next week we will discuss the second of Ignatius rules, which deals with what occurs in the person who is now moving towards God and away from sin. May the Blest Virgin Mary continue to intercede for us and bring our hearts closer to Christ's Sacred Heart, that the ears of our hearts may listen ever more closely to the still silent voice of our LORD. Many blessing to you all and have a joyous week!
